As faithful servants of God, can we forgive?

My Brothers and Sisters
in the Risen Lord,

In today's Gospel from Matthew, a parable invites us to reflect on two questions: Are we faithful servants, and can we forgive others as our loving God forgives us?

Creation is a wonderful gift given to us for our care.

As servants of the Lord, consider how you care for this remarkable gift.

We not only hear about forgiveness in the gospel.

We also hear in our first reading from Sirach - "[Wrath and anger are hateful things, yet the sinner hugs them tight] ...Forgive your neighbor's injustice, then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven."

Holding anger takes a good deal of energy away from the goodness we can do.

Notice today, where you place your energy. Consider how you could change your heart. Where are we called to forgive.

Last weekend, Jesus offered a formula for reconciliation.

Today, we hear Peter follow this guidance with a question, "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive."

Reconciliation is constant and difficult work. This is how the beloved of God is to live.

Henri Nouwen, a spiritual master, suggests we do not always treat others as made in the image of God [or beloved] because we refuse to acknowledge our own special relationship with God.

Can you forgive deeply with your heart? There is a healing we -- only experience in forgiveness.

Give peace O Lord to those who wait for you. Hear the prayers of your servants.

Sacraments of the Catholic Church

What is a sacrament?

Sacraments are outward signs of inward grace, instituted by Christ, for our sanctification.

According to the United States Council of Bishops their “visual reality is their outward expression, the form they take, and the way in which they are administered and received.

Alternately, their invisible reality goes far beyond the senses and these physical signs, so that individuals can receive the very life and holiness of God

The sacraments give us God’s help and grace and show Jesus’ presence in our lives.

Guided by the Holy Spirit, there are seven sacraments of the Church, organized into three categories: (1) Sacraments of Initiation that lay the foundation of Christian life – Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist; (2) Sacraments of Healing that celebrate the restorative power of Jesus – Reconciliation and the Anointing of the Sick; and (3) Sacraments of Service – Matrimony and Holy Orders.

As the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches, Christ instituted these sacraments to sanctify and nourish those who receive them worthily as part of the saving work of Christ. God shares his holiness with us, so we can make the world a better and more reverent place.
